2015 WHERE Challenge Continues to Engage Canadian Students

2015 was a successful year for the WHERE Challenge; the contest that complements the Earth science curriculum in schools across Canada. There were 122 submissions involving 458 students, 13 schools across Canada and 18 teachers. An increased number of project submissions in French were received this year, as well as an increase in the number of winning projects originating in Quebec.
